SWISS NATIONALITY ROOM COMMITTEE (SNRC) REPORT

The Swiss Room Project at the Nationality Rooms Program at the University of Pittsburgh is moving ahead at a very fast pace these days. Our committee is doing all we can to have the Swiss Room constructed at Pitt's Cathedral of Learning in 2011, with fabrication of many of the room's components commencing in 2010. We are currently looking at a May-November 2011 window for construction. If you read no further in this article, please know that we *STILL* need your continued generosity toward this project to meet the funding balances we require in the Swiss Room construction account at Pitt, and we need this money as early as possible in 2010. Now that we are in the home stretch, the sooner we receive your gifts, the sooner we can begin construction!

Historical Recap of the Swiss Room Project

The SASP Board is making this edition of the Swiss American Society of Pittsburgh newsletter available to many new members and many registered Swiss through the courtesy of the General Consul's office in NYC. I was invited to recap some of the history of this project for the benefit of people just hearing about the Swiss Room for the first time. We invite your questions about this project or your generous donations directed to our committee if you feel inclined to help us complete this project in the near term.

The Nationality Rooms Program at the University of Pittsburgh has been in existence since the 1930s. This program celebrates the contributions of immigrants to Pittsburgh from around the world and their descendants. These ethnic communities raise up funds and donate an actual working classroom based on pre-1787 architectural designs. To date, 28 Nationality Rooms have been completed over the past 75 years. Since the 1950s, the local Swiss community has talked about a Swiss Room. Our committee became an official partner with Pitt in this effort in late 1998. We reserved room 321 for the Swiss Room and have raised over \$193,000 since then. At this time we require about \$75,000 to comfortably reach our minimum construction account balance.

The Swiss Room is based on a late medieval design featured in the Landesmuseum, Zurich. Our room's theme is a tribute to Swiss education, celebrating the work of Pestalozzi and Rousseau, two 18th century Swiss who championed education for all (especially children) regardless of status and wealth. Jean-Jacques Rousseau came from the French-speaking city of Geneva; Johann Heinrich Pestalozzi came from the German-speaking city of Zurich. Their portraits, done in the simple drawn style of Basler Hans Holbein, will hang in the room, along with an antique map from the early 1700s showing the Swiss Confederation written in Latin. Dark beamed ceilings will house high tech lighting systems. Stylized carving will decorate the frieze around the room, the beam endpoints and wall moldings. The room's highlight will be the 26 stabbellen chairs, with cantonal ensigns on the back of each chair, and gorgeous trestle tables representing the four language areas of Switzerland. Leaded windows will feature subtle stained glass paying tribute to the three cantons of the first Swiss Confederation in 1291, Schwyz, Uri, and Unterwalden.

Architect-of-Record and Pitt Facilities Meetings

Since last summer's August 1 picnic, members of our committee have met with Pitt Facilities and project manager Adrienne Spellone, who oversee the construction of the room, and our architect-of-record Stephen Altherr. We have met 8 times regarding shaping the final details of the design, the lighting and electrical, the AV setup, and outlining the bid process and construction documents. Many of you saw the beautiful detailed design drawings at the Christmas luncheon or the Holiday Open House last December 5-6. Stephen's oversight and diligence at this stage of our room planning has been extremely useful for us to stay on schedule and to continue cost-consciousness with our future expenses. He has been mightily assisted by detail and expense suggestions from woodcrafting master Rich Sink, and he continues to work hand-in-hand with our Swiss architect Justin Ruessli of Lucerne. In January, we gave Stephen the go-ahead to finalize bid drawings for the general contracting involved with the building of the room and he is currently working on those plans. We hope to have all our bid requests back within 90 days and start issuing contracts. Some of this work with the fine woods involved will begin later in the spring.

Master woodworker and carver Richard Sink (who lives near Helvetia, West Virginia, and has years of experience constructing Swiss furniture) has been our leading choice for creating all of the room's wood features since we became aware of his amazing abilities in early 2009. Some of his plans for prepping and drying the wood will commence soon. The SNRC is constantly impressed by his deliberate and complete attention to detail, and we feel his unique artistic vision and multi-disciplinary excellence will help keep our project under tight cost control as well as creating the beauty identified with Swiss craftsmanship.

Fundraising

Our committee has met twice recently for fundraising strategy sessions. As we continue to move ahead on our fundraising totals, we are getting a clearer picture of what our final funding total needs to look like to proceed on time. Although we still need quite a bit of funding, we are confident that our multi-faceted funding strategy will bring us the needed funds in time when we need to pay for commodities, contracting and the decorative arts featuring the finished woodworking of Swiss wood carving master Richard Sink.

The cantonal chair auction funds have come in fulfilling 96% of their pledged \$26,000. We allotted 3 years for this funding to come in and our Swiss community has come through well ahead of that plan. The 4 language tables are 78% funded, with the German and French tables completely funded, leaving a particularly special gift opportunity still to someone with a special interest in Switzerland's Italian or Romansch heritage. The special gift opportunities have yielded generous donations for the Uri window, the blackboard, the teacher lectern, the carved radiator covers, and other features.

Some of our committee members are dealing with large gift asks on a one-to-one basis. This is very time-consuming work. We encourage everyone reading this to mention this project, and our needs for large donations, to those with means who are proud of their Swiss heritage. We know everyone wishes to see the long-overlooked Swiss gain a beautiful room dedicated to educational excellence taking its rightful place alongside the other 28 Nationality Rooms. We continue to publicize this effort to PA-based Swiss companies, as well as to multi-national companies with Swiss roots. The efforts of Chairman Kunz along with new committee member Dominique Schinabeck to seek new donor leads have been successful. Our committee hopes to meet personally with Ben Roethlisberger, our honorary and most famous committee member, to show him the latest stage of plans, now that the football season is over (all too soon).

Our committee knows that all of you reading this article are together the best ambassadors for the successful completion of this project. We thank you again for any and all efforts you make to draw attention to your extended Swiss family members towards our goal, and for the monetary contributions you are called to make. This room is an international jewel and will be kept in perpetuity by the University of Pittsburgh as an eternal tribute to Swiss excellence in education; it is NOT a one-time museum or exhibition installation.

Edith Bottonari in Graubünden

When one thinks of a young girl in Switzerland, Heidi generally comes to mind. In Johanna Spyri's famous book, Heidi lives with her grandfather in the Canton of Graubünden. When Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh member Edith Bottonari looks back on her childhood in Switzerland, she has many fond memories, including reading *Heidi* over and over again and, like the book's heroine, living in beautiful Graubünden.

Edith was born in Zurich and moved to Chur when she was five. So it was in that town in Graubünden that she spent her formative years. Favorite activities included reading, hiking in the surrounding mountains with her father, ice skating every day in the winter, swimming, and having many boyfriends. However, as much as she loved her town, Edith had a great desire to see more of the world and learn languages beyond German.

So, at age 18, she ventured to England to work as an au pair for the family of the headmaster of Marlborough College. By the end of her one-year stay, she was fluent enough in English to read the book *Gone with the Wind* in her new language. Little did she know, English would become the first language of her children one day.

From England, Edith moved to France where she studied at the Alliance Française. This was followed by many years in Italy where she mastered her fourth language. Through acquaintances, she met and married Augie, her husband of 46 years, in Rome. Their first two children were born in Naples, where they lived for three years. At that time, Augie, an engineer with U.S. Steel, was transferred back to his native Pittsburgh.

While Edith has grown to like Pittsburgh, it was a difficult adjustment at first. She missed her beautiful native land, parents, and European friends. But every summer, she returned with her three children to Switzerland. Through these trips, the entire family developed a strong bond for the country. Their daughter, Caroline, now lives in Zurich.

Edith has enjoyed being a member of the Swiss-American Society of Pittsburgh for 40 years. Today, she serves as a member of the Swiss Nationality Room Committee. The room's Graubünden chair has been sponsored by her sons, Richard and Philip, in her honor.

Would you like to learn more about a Swiss American who Thomas Jefferson appointed Secretary of the Treasury? On Sat. June 12th, carpool from Pittsburgh or meet other SAS members at 1pm at the home of Albert Gallatin, Friendship Hill National historic site, a 661 acre park located 1 Washington Pkwy, Farmington, PA, about 2 hrs. SW of downtown Pittsburgh. Born in Geneva, Gallatin was orphaned at age 9, but came to the U.S. in 1780. In the next 20 yrs, he became a businessman, Pennsylvania legislator, then congressman. In 1801, he became Secretary of the Treasury. He reduced the national debt, purchased the Louisiana Territory, and funded the Lewis & Clark exploration while in office. 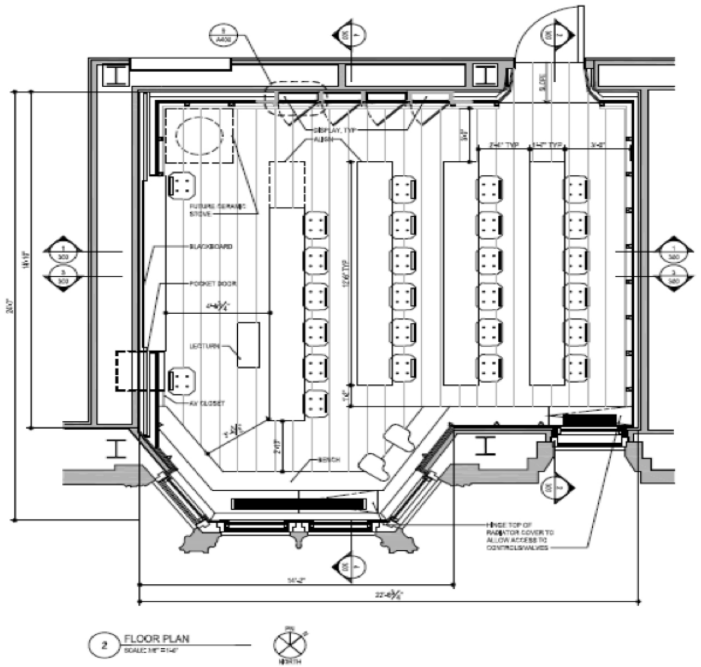
